Authorship Declaration

To be named as an author on a research publication, a researcher must have made a substantial scholarly contribution to the work and be able to take responsibility for at least that part of the work they contributed. Substantial intellectual involvement is required.

Attribution of authorship must be based on substantial contributions in a combination of:

- Conception and design of the project
- Analysis and interpretation of research data
- Drafting significant part of the work or critically revising it so as to contribute to the interpretation.

A person who qualifies as an author must not be included or excluded as an author without their permission, in writing.

Researchers must offer authorship to all people, including research trainees, who meet the criteria for authorship as listed above. Those offered authorship must accept or decline in writing.

Authorship must not be offered to those who do not meet the criteria for authorship as listed above.

Researchers must ensure that all those who have contributed in other ways to the research, facilities or materials are properly acknowledged (eg research assistants and technical writers). When individuals are named, their consent must be obtained in writing.

The Principal Investigator of a study/trial should agree on the authorship of a publication at an early stage in the research project and review their decisions periodically. Co-investigators of the study/trial and research assistants should be informed of these decisions and any alternations to them.
