



## A history of giving

When an appeal was made to build a hospital that would address the desperate plight of those suffering from incurable diseases, Elizabeth Austin responded with a gift of £6,000.

Elizabeth's extraordinary act of philanthropy inspired others in the community to donate, and in August 1882 the Austin Hospital opened its doors.

From its humble beginnings as a home for those who were believed to be beyond medical aid, by 1935 Austin Hospital had become the largest cancer hospital in Australia. In 1956 services expanded offering a comprehensive spinal injury treatment and rehabilitation facility, and in 1960 it was officiated as a general health service with the opening of an outpatient and casualty block

Since its establishment, Austin Hospital, now known as Austin Health, has evolved combining services with Heidelberg Repatriation Hospital, Royal Talbot Rehabilitation Centre, and the Olivia Newton-John Cancer Wellness & Research Centre.




"He was always extraordinarily grateful for the liver that gave him a second chance at life," says Sue. "He knew someone

Inset: Ashley Johnson (14/10/1960 - 21/09/2018) had died to give him that chance and it meant a lot to him to give back."


"Sue and I miss Ashley terribly, but we feel honoured to be his ambassadors, sharing his story and proudly continuing on his legacy," says Chris.

### You can leave a gift in your Will to Austin Health in the following ways:



#### Fixed percentage

A fixed percentage of your estate allows you to nominate a specific percentage of your estate to Austin Health. A gift of this kind does not depend on your estate being of any set value or size and it is flexible enough to allow for changes in the composition of your assets or financial situation. No matter how your estate changes, whether it grows or decreases in value, your decision as to the proportions will always remain the same.



#### Residual bequests

A residual bequest is a gift which is provided after the remainder of your estate has been distributed and your loved ones, taxes and expenses have been taken care of – it may be the remaining amount after your estate has been distributed or it may be a percentage remaining. As a residual bequest is not a fixed financial sum, it automatically adjusts as the value of your estate changes.



#### Specific sum of money

You may nominate an exact dollar amount to gift to Austin Health, detailing the department or area in which you wish to support.

Leaving a gift in your Will can be a private and confidential decision. We understand some people may wish to remain anonymous or not be publically recognised, we respect that decision and our commitment to you is to honour your wishes.
